Course Description

This is a theory course for the students of music in the post graduate level. Students are expected to have a hold on their core subject and would be in a position to pass on their knowledge. They need to learn the art and knack of teaching music. Similarly, they are required to understand the concepts of aesthetics applicable for music and performing arts.

Course Introduction

Students of M.A. Music are expected to have a prior music training (either through formal or informal education) of at least 5 years. By this time, students would be prepared to pursue a career in performing arts. Some may go into performing, while others may take to teaching or other allied careers in music. The most common profession that the students could choose would be music teaching. Whether he is an average performer or an excellent one, there is always an urge to train students. Most music teachers do not have formal training in teaching. Teaching an abstract subject requires adequate knowledge in the subject and the art of teaching. Since it is an oral tradition, there is much need to develop a positive relationship with students from different socio-economic and cultural backgrounds. Students may be of varied age groups, may have different levels of proficiency in the arts and may be differently endowed with talents. The first module of this course covers topics including broadly, the meaning of education, its four-fold aims, steps in the learning process, teaching techniques and formulation of syllabi.

The basic purpose of all the arts is beauty. When an artist creates something, it is his thirst for the beauty that triggers him to do so. Aesthetics is a branch of philosophy that deals with understanding the beauty. The students of music will develop a sound understanding of the principles concerned with the nature and appreciation of beauty through the second module of this course.

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This course is designed with the following objectives –

To equip students with inter-personal skills and nurture trained music teachers with high integrity

To help students to mould further personalities through music training

To introduce students to the aesthetics as a branch of philosophy for arts

To develop an understanding of Rasa-Siddhanta (Rasa Theory) in Indian aesthetics and its relationship with music

To relate aesthetics with each aspect of music including basic elements, forms and Gharanas

Course Outcome

After completion of this course, the students will be able to -

Develop oneself to be a mature, understanding teacher, who will work towards moulding his students rather than teach for the sake of earning his bread.

Understand the aesthetic principles for arts and relate each aspect of music to aesthetics

Analyse the music with the perspectives of Rasa Theory

Appreciate music in a better way, and help others to do so

Develop a sense of philosophy imbibed in the arts
