Course Description

This is a core course being offered to the students of B.A.B.Ed programme, in their first semester. As the name suggests, it is an introductory level course on Linguistics, focusing on English language in particular.

Course Introduction

Linguistics is broadly defined as the scientific study of language. It involves analysing the structure of language, the rules governing the sound pattern and word order and the meaning making within a context. It also deals with historical, cultural, social and political factors that influence language. This course will outline the basics of linguistics, and introduce the learner to various branches that exist. Linguistics has high interdisciplinary characteristics and this course will also expose the learner to those fields.

Course Objective

- To develop a better understanding of human communication.
- To introduce the students to the key concepts in Linguistics.
- To equip students with a thorough knowledge of the various linguistic features of English language.

- Identify the different branches of Linguistics and its relation to different streams. (CO1)
