Course Description

This is a regular core practical course for the post-graduate students of music. The course is focussed on 'Gamak', a type of ornamentation of Gayaki.

Course Introduction

As a student progresses in the vocal music, various elements of ornamentation are introduced. These help to beautify the performance. 'Gamak' is one of such elements. The core meaning of Gamak is intonation in which a contextual use of musical notes is brought out. In such applications, a note of primary application is accompanied by a touch of preceding and/or succeeding note(s) – thus enlarging its tonal context. Traditionally and appropriately, Gamak is described as a vibrating effect employed in producing tone to the delight of listeners. This course is designed to train the vocal students in the various techniques of Gamak and their application in Khayal music.

Course Objective

The course is designed with following objectives -

- > To introduce students with the concept of Gamak
- > To train the students in various Gamak techniques
- > To develop the sense for using Gamak in various forms of music
- > To introduce with the benefits of Gamak usage and also the limitations

Course Outcome



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After completion of this course, the students will be able to -

- 1. Produce Gamak in all the Ragas of the syllabus
- 2. Use various types of Gamak-s in various song forms
- 3. Develop the sense of use of Gamak in Ragas and song forms depending upon their Prakriti (nature)
