Course Description

This course has been designed to give the students a broad view of the Sanskrit Language and its vast reach in the different fields of Indic Knowledge Systems.

Course Introduction

Very often people think that the knowledge in Sanskrit texts is archaic and irrelevant to day-to-day lives. At best, 'bhakti' texts are seen to give spiritual sustenance, but other Sanskrit literature seems useless because we do not see its application in our lives. Some people, who are learned in the Sanskrit language, may benefit fully from related knowledge systems, but there is no reason why each one of us should not benefit at least to some extent from such knowledge, and that too in every sphere of our lives.

Course Objective

The course is designed with the following main objectives:

- To introduce learners to the beauty and nuances of the Sanskrit language
- To enable learners to understand the relevance of the Sanskrit language and related knowledge systems in their own lives



 To provide learners with methods through which they can access knowledge through Sanskrit and apply it to benefit key areas in their lives, including mind, body, spirit, relationships and career

Module 1: Introduction to the charm of the Sanskrit language

3 Hours

(This module is to introduce the students to the richness of the language and its contents. We know Sanskrit is a wonderful language but what makes it so will be introduced in these three sessions.)

- Richness of semantic tradition, well described language, Antiquity.
 (How one single root can be constructed into several words, Free word order, Words with several meanings (For ex- Word हरि has fourteen meanings) and several words with a single meaning, how letters are pronounced etc.)
- Creative verse styles (Riddles, puns, word play)
 (Some selected *citrak\(\bar{Q}\) vya* verses to convey the charm of Sanskrit literature.)
- Various disciplines in Sanskrit
 (Sanskrit texts deals with various modern disciplines such as science, economics, mathematics etc. With the help of the text "Pride of India" such aspects will be shown to the students to enhance their interest towards the language and its texts)

20 Hours

(This module is designed to enable the student to read, understand and to speak Sanskrit language. $Kar \underline{n}abh \overline{a}ra$ is a play written in Sanskrit by Bh \overline{a} sa 2000 years ago. This play is based on the incidents of $Mah \overline{a}bh \overline{a}rata$. $Kar \underline{n}abh \overline{a}ra$ is an epitome for the charm of Sanskrit language. Through the text, students are introduced to the basics of Sanskrit literary concepts.)

(Maxims can be used in various aspects of the life, sometimes just as a phrase to bring beauty to the sentence and sometimes as a guide to the problem. In this part student will be introduced to about 4-5 maxims/sessions and their uses. Maxims are listed below out of which some will be taught in the class and some will be given as a task of reading for the students.)

(The wise says that on this earth, there are three jewels - water, food and *Subhasita*. *Subhashita* is a literary genre of Sanskrit epigrammatic poems and their message is an aphorism, maxim, advice, fact, truth, or a lesson. Selected *Subhasita*-s from the text Nitishatakam, on personal, family and societal values will be covered in this module. As the text *Viduraniti* talks about the essential qualities for wise rulers like Self-awareness and Self-control Lofty ideals, Clarity of goals, Industriousness, Ethical conduct, selected verses from *Viduraniti* will be taught to familiarize these lessons of ethics)
