#### 1. Introduction

This is a writing lab course, and aims to make the students not only better writers, but also more motivated writers in English. It includes reading authentic English texts as a means of appreciating good writing, before moving on to a series of exercises where students hone their writing skills for narrative and non-narrative writing, and for use in a variety of situations.

## 2. Course Objectives

This course aims to make learners better writers in English, in both formal and informal situations, through regular guided practice.
